

Museum of Transportation

Car Show Report By Chris Smith

On Sunday May 16, the National Museum of Transportation hosted its annual Model T/Model A/and early V8 show. This was the first major outing for my 1936 Phaeton since acquiring it last Fall.

As of Saturday, weather forecasts were either predicting perfectly clear weather, or rain all day—typical Spring in St. Louis. By late Saturday/early Sunday, the forecast cleared, and a beautiful day "appeared" to be in store.

When both of my 9-year old twins expressed an interest in taking the '36, I told my wife that I had to run with it. Frankly, she was all too happy to have us out of the house for a change. So, the two girls and I headed to Chesterfield and the warehouse to pick up the car. After a quick walk around and inspection, they pronounced it road worthy and off we went.

We decided to avoid highways. The kids initially fought over who would copilot (monitor gauges and such) and who would navigate (read Google maps and tell us when and where to turn).

As I am sure anyone with kids and grandkids can relate, personalities sometimes run in extremes. We are no exception. Lucille sports an Audrey Hepburn (Breakfast at Tiffany's) short cut, and wears whatever happens to be out. She is the super responsible one. Laura likes dresses, jewels, is very into fashion, and sometimes a "little" less responsible. Laura decided she would navigate. She immediately plopped herself down in the backseat, stretched out, and started

singing. Lucille and I gave each other a look that said we both doubted we would ever make it to the museum. Somehow, by some miracle, we made it. Maybe singing navigation could be a "thing"?

We were immediately greeted by a large contingent of Model T and Aers, and club member Bruce Williams. Steve Brauer was also there with a very polished V8. The kids immediately suggested that I park at least one spot away so that the contrast in polish was not quite so apparent. Shortly thereafter a rustic early T with a raccoon (?) tail parked next to us—which they thought was the coolest thing there. They thought it was unfortunate that I was now parked between two much cooler cars. After a very short-lived chat with some attendees, I was quickly pulled into a tour of the Museum with the girls.

Large clouds appeared in the sky, and the weather apps now showed a barrage of thunderstorms looming. While we have side curtains for the '36, they have never been installed and figuring that out would certainly take longer than the drive back to Chesterfield. And so, we packed up and raced off to try to beat the storm. We failed. As we cruised down 141 in the storm, my backseat driver (Laura, who was also once again singing), lamented that I was going way too slow: "Dad, even that Model T just passed you." While I am pretty sure it was a Model A, I am also pretty sure its driver had a lot more confidence in his stopping power in the rain. I did not, and our 45-mph felt like a breakneck pace to me in the storm surrounded by modern cars weaving in and out much too carelessly for my taste.
