


Bruces Book Report

The Birth of Chrysler Corporation and Its Engineering Legacy- by Carl Breer

One of the books I read while at the beach in Michigan this summer is <u>The Birth of Chrysler Corporation.</u> It is written by Carl Breer, one of the "Three Musketeers" hired by Walter Chrysler when he set up his compa-

ny. Carl Breer, Fred Zeder, and Owen Skelton were three young engineers who worked at Studebaker, and they brought a great range of skills and willingness to take on big challenges. Walter Chrysler hired them and challenged them to design a new car with major advancements in auto technology, which became the first Chrysler. The book is essentially a memoir by Breer, where he tells many stories behind the creation and evolution of a number of important automotive features... hydraulic brakes, "floating power" engine vibration dampening, sealed beam headlights, etc. The largest space



in the book is reserved for the story of the Chrysler Airflow, which Breer clearly felt <u>a</u> bit of hurt over its lack of commercial success. There are a number of details that demonstrate the strong competitive nature of the early days when technology was rapidly advancing, e.g., Breer takes credit for the adoption of helical gears in transmissions ("Silent Second" gears), which the book points out were launched in 1933 Chryslers; Ford started using them in 1932.

The book is an interesting, easy read that takes you back to the conference room, engineering lab, and test track where new innovations that we take for granted (or know nothing about because additional innovations rendered the developments of the '20s and '30s to be ancient history) were developed by some of the most gifted pioneers and inventors of the early automobile age.






